Lent: A Time to be Born Again

Lent emerged as a time for serious preparation for those entering the faith. It became clear that a similar time was needed for the people of God for renewal and re-renewal. Not born again just once, but again and again and again. So we are moving into the Lenten season this Ash Wednesday, to consciously take advantage of the next 40 days through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving to be born again and be drawn closer to God. The question we need to ask ourselves is "what in our lives gets in the way of our relationship with God and God's people? We are looking for self-denial that leads to communion with God and authentic community among us. So what is it? Our smart phones? Or the way they waste our time? What about our need for security? 

FEBRUARY: Fundraising for FOOD Pantry

For the past few years, we have used the month of February to raise funds for our parish food pantry known as CATHERINE'S CUPBOARD. Founded in 2002, our pantry has grown and is well-known throughout the county. We serve on average 1,000 families each year. Our pantry is open the first and third Tuesday each month from 5:30pm until all are served. Our annual budget has grown to over \$30,000 and purchases from Southern Tier Food Bank the food needed to provide healthy meals for families, plus cleaning and personal items not included with SNAP (i.e., food stamps). Of the 1,000 families, one-third of them are senior citizens trying to get by on Social Security, food stamps, etc. Heating, electric and prescription bills take a bigger portion of their income each year. Many families that come are working, but due to their low wages cannot pay their basic expenses. We are the "helping hand" to them, allowing them to live in their home, with heat and lights, feed their kids and provide the best they can. Going to a food pantry and asking for help is very hard to do; we understand this and try to make it as stress-free as possible. The first week of February kicked off with the SOUPER BOWL OF CARING led by our students in Faith Formation. In December, 2 food drives were held for our pantry by the Hillcrest Fire Dept. and Chenango Forks Girl Scout Service Unit. Various food drives/ collections are also held which support us at Nimmonsburg Methodist, Ogden Methodist and First Church of Nazarene and in Chenango Valley schools. These drives plus generous donations from many of you are always deeply appreciated. This past year our pantry not only helped the many who came during our regular hours, but also helped a family after a major fire damaged their home. Back in September, during a neighborhood evacuation of about 100 families, we were able to help supply breakfast at the Red Cross shelter set up at the Hillcrest Fire Station. Another event in early December caught Father Tim and I by surprise, but we were so happy we could help – during an extremely cold weekend, the Homeless Coalitation rescued 30 young adults who were living under a downtown bridge on the riverbank. Three went straight to the ER due to their condition, and the rest were given shelter at a local motel but there was no food and being a weekend all "services" were closed until Monday. Our pantry provided the basics (soups, cereal, peanut butter & jelly, coffee, juice and bread & milk plus personal care items) to get them through a couple days until more permanent care was available. These 30 were only a small fraction of the hundreds of homeless who live in Broome County. Our pantry will ALWAYS serve those who are homeless. Some pantries may not give to the homeless, but that is not the case for Catherine's Cupboard. Our pantry serves all who ask for help. Cash is not given, but a gift card to Weis Grocery is available if needed. If you help to continue our pantry's mission during this campaign, your Pantry volunteers will be forever grateful.
