Gun Violence:

Will Change emerge from the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School tragedy?

The tragic shootings of the 15 students and 3 faculty staff in Parkland, Florida, Valentine's Day, have inspired new discussion on gun violence and firearm control. But will it become a turning point, a tipping point in a national debate that pits individual freedom against public safety and see the activism that has evolved from the students of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. They and thousands of students around the country are mobilizing to hold men and women in Congress and State Capital accountable—we hope they listen to these innocent voices and not the lobby of the NRA.

Gun Control advocates see this as a moment to strike while the iron is hot, or perhaps rather while the cooling of an automatic assault weapon (AR-15) might be beaten into some sort of pruning hook. This tragedy happened on Valentine's Day that was also Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the Lenten Season. As we begin the season of repentance, let us repent for the violence in our society that has accommodated legislation that justifies the proliferation of guns in our country. Lent is also a time to change—to turn around—do we or do our representatives in Washington have the moral courage to turn around and act in legislation that will bring sanity to this awful scourge in our country. How many Columbine's, Newtown's, Virginia Tech's, Binghamton's, Charleston's, Orlando's, Las Vegas', and the list could go on, do we have to witness the anguish of parents, teachers, children for change to take place?

As Catholics we are called to be engaged in the public debate on gun violence prevention. We need to urge our Senators (Schumer & Gillebrand) and Representative (Claudia Tenney) to support policy and legislative measures that A.) ban assault weapons; B.) require in depth background checks for all gun purchased; C.) improve access to mental health care for those who may be prone to violence.

Our churches, schools, malls, movie theatres, dance clubs, concerts, civic associations, should be safe places where people can gather without fear of being victim of gun violence. **IT IS TIME FOR THIS TO END!**

Prayer for Peace and Comfort After Gun Violence

God, comforter of the broken and disheartened, we come to you plagued with an agonized grief after yet one more outbreak of senseless gun violence. We come to you, people of all ages, ethnicities, and walks of life. We represent one voice, the voice of bitter weeping, echoing throughout our cities and resounding in communities throughout the world. As violence abounds, we sit in the darkness, sitting alongside the suffering on the mourner's bench. We are Rachel, mourning with wordless sobs, the lives of those sacrificed on the altar of violence. We are Rachel, weeping for the wounded, for those whose minds and bodies are etched with painful memories of men's unjustifiable rage. We are Rachel, lamenting with the families who have lost loved ones whose cries of despair join with those from tragedies of gun violence. We are Rachel, perplexed with troubled souls, and searching for answers, seeking to understand what would cause humans to inflict pain on their fellow sisters and brothers. We are Rachel, exasperated, grasping—crying out: How long will this wave of violence consume your people? How long, O God, must we succumb to this perverse violence that crushes the breath and life of countless innocent people? How long, O God, will it take for us to beat our swords into plowshares, And spears into pruning hooks? Compassionate God, we turn to you in our grief. Provide comfort to the broken-hearted, all those who are frightened, despairing, and who are hoping for peace. Help us to become deeply aware of the shared humanity that comes when a sister or brother falls victim to violence. Guide us on a path of understanding and peaceful dialogue. Show us rightful ways to rid our homes, our neighborhoods, our workplaces, our cities, and our world of weapons that destroy lives. Grant us the courage to stand together, to join with Rachel in her strident protest of lament calling for an end to gun violence. Empower us to be people of light and hope amid a world painted with darkness and violence. Amen.

DeBella Scholarship Information

St. Francis of Assisi Finance Committee, in conjunction with the DeBella Oversight Committee has set aside a sum of money to establish the John M. DeBella College Scholarships. February: Fundraising for our food pantry

Why do we have a pantry? Many families are living on the edge and a drop in food stamps (SNAP), high heating bills, loss of a job or illness can push families over the edge, creating a need for assistance. Our pantry and the other 30+ pantries in our county catch them and relieve some of their stress. Our pantry serves people from their early 20s to their mid-80s. NO ONE is ever refused and we try to give them as much as possible without judging and always with a smile. NOT EVERYONE HAS A SAFETY NET OR SAVINGS ACCOUNT. **THANK YOU for all you do for the pantry and those we serve.**

Your name is Trudy Louis and you are 62. You live in a one-room apartment in Sunville. You do not have a kitchen to prepare meals. Your niece and her baby were just evicted from their apartment and they have come to live with you. You just purchased a small microwave to heat milk for the baby, but you do not have a stove or hot plate. You have been living on a \$400 monthly Social Security check, and you are hoping that having your niece around will help to pay some of the bills. The apartment costs \$280 per month and the utilities cost around \$80. Your phone is \$40 a month, and your cable bill is \$45. Your niece makes \$500 a month working at a restaurant. She has to take three buses to get there, and three buses to get back. This costs her about \$210 per month in transportation. You have a medical co-pay of \$100 per month, and the baby's medicines have been costing about \$45.

Disclaimer: This is an example and does not depict a specific family living in Broome County, but provides a representation of many living under similar conditions.
