

A Mercy and Peacebuilding Approach to Gun Violence

The news is filled with reports of violence, of news of mass shootings at home and raging wars abroad. Many four or more people shot in a single incident—have reached one or more per day in the United States. have claimed hundreds of thousands dead, and displaced millions of refugees. Other conflicts take innocent lives around the world. More than ever, the Church and all people of good will must work together to confront the pervasive culture of violence. The Church has been a consistent voice for the promotion of peace at home and around the world, and a strong advocate for the reasonable regulation of firearms. Christ's love and mercy must guide us. The Church recognizes that recourse to self-defense is legitimate for one's own safety. In today's world, however, weapons that are increasingly capable of inflicting great suffering in a short period of time are simply too accessible.

Remembering All Those Who Lost Their Lives to Gun Violence

We pray in the spirit of the Psalms: We are in distress, we are in anguish. Our tears are bitter as again and again The lives you have created are disrespected, destroyed, Because of fear, of hate, of refusal to see the others As part of oneself, Because weapons are more common than compassion, than solidarity. We pray for the dead, For their families and friends in grief. We pray for the living, May the healing begin, For the wounded, For all those in the frantic crowd, For the local communities. For this nation, In distress, in anguish. We pray that we may begin To see the violence end And peace be with us all. Amen.

5th Sunday of Lent: Justice Challenge

The Gospel Sunday recounts the story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead. It is eloquent to read that Jesus wept when he saw how devastated Lazarus' friends and relatives were about his friend's death. Jesus showed such compassion and human emotion. The word compassion is from the Latin words com (meaning with) and pati (to suffer). Compassion, then, is suffering with others who are hurting. Your challenge this week is to show compassion to someone who is suffering. You might donate money to CRS or another organization helping hurting people. Whatever you do, remember that compassion means entering into that person's human condition, not with condescension, but with a genuine sense of walking with them in their experience

Lenten Focus 2023

Our parish Lenten focus is the reality of social sin. The real danger of social sin or structural sin is that our blindness prevents us from recognizing it. How can we studies conclude that mass shootings—when defined as recognize structural/social sin? These sins would be any action or omission against God, against others, the community, and the environment. It is a sin against future Overseas, wars in places such as Syria and Ukraine generations and is manifested in the acts and habits of pollution and destruction of the harmony of the environment. We invite you to examine social sin in our world via our video series.

- After Buffalo, After Uvalde, After Tulsa, this conversation on gun violence responds to the question: What does Catholic Social teaching require to change racist attitudes and structures in our country.
- "Who is my Neighbor?" addressing the encyclical Fratelli Tutti, Pope Francis' personal call to encounter, friendship and solidarity to all in our lives, community, and world.



The first week of April of 2023 is a special moment among the three Abrahamic faith traditions-Judaism, Christianity and Islam—as major annual observances will overlap this year. Muslims began their month-long observance of Ramadan on March 22nd, during which they purify their intentions, words and actions. On April 2nd, Christians will celebrate Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week leading up to redemption on Easter Sunday with the resurrection of Jesus. On April 5th, Jews will celebrate their liberation from bondage during the feast of Passover. May this holy season for all of our faith traditions be a time of rich renewal to faster healing, reconciliation, peace, and compassion in our struggling world.

5th Sunday of Lent: Creation Care Tip

As we near the end of Lent, the readings remind us that although something may appear dead, God can bring new life to it. We may be fearful about the direction things are going when we hear about species extinction, polluted waterways, or wildfires ravaging forests. This week, keep your eyes and ears open for stories and examples of the regenerative power of nature. Look for reminders of new life coming from what seems like death: a seed planted that will sprout, a cocoon that will bring forth a butterfly, or an egg that will crack for a bird to be hatched.
