

A Mercy and Peacebuilding Approach to Gun Violence

The news is filled with reports of violence, of news of mass shootings at home and raging wars abroad. Many studies conclude that mass shootings—when defined as four or more people shot in a single incident—have reached one or more per day in the United States. Overseas, wars in places such as Syria and Ukraine have claimed hundreds of thousands dead, and displaced millions of refugees. Other conflicts take innocent lives around the world. More than ever, the Church and all people of good will must work together to confront the pervasive culture of violence. The Church has been a consistent voice for the promotion of peace at home and around the world, and a strong advocate for the reasonable regulation of firearms. Christ's love and mercy must guide us. In today's world, weapons that are increasingly capable of inflicting great suffering in a short period of time are simply too accessible.

Remembering All Those Who Lost Their Lives to Gun Violence

We pray in the spirit of the Psalms:
We are in distress, we are in anguish.
Our tears are bitter as again and again
The lives you have created are disrespected,
destroyed,

Because of fear, of hate, of refusal to see the others As part of oneself,

For the wounded,


For all those in the frantic crowd, For the local communities,

The first week of April of 2023 is a special moment among the three Abrahamic faith traditions—Judaism, Christianity and Islam—as major annual observances will overlap this year. Muslims began their month-long observance of Ramadan on March 22nd, during which they purify their intentions, words and actions. On April 2nd, Christians celebrate Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week leading up to redemption on Easter Sunday with the resurrection of Jesus. On April 5th, Jews will celebrate their liberation from bondage during the feast of Passover. May this holy season for all of our faith traditions be a time of rich renewal to faster healing, reconciliation, peace, and compassion in our struggling world.

Palm Sunday: Creation Care Tip

"Jesus took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it, he broke it, gave it to the disciples, and said, 'Take, eat; this is my body.'"—Matthew 26:26

Jesus took bread, something made with the simplest of ingredients, and imbued it with much more. This week, choose at least one meal to eat using only simple, unprocessed foods that nourish the body. Choose whole foods common in NY instead of food grown, processed, packaged, and transported from afar. As you eat your simple meal, pray in thanksgiving for what you have and for those who don't have enough to eat.

Palm Sunday: Justice Challenge

The First Reading for Palm Sunday contains one of several powerful images of the Suffering Servant found in this book of the Bible. While the author was describing the nation of Israel when he wrote, the passages about the suffering servant took on new meaning after the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. It is easy to see how Jesus embodied the traits of Isaiah's suffering servant, one of which was his peaceful approach to conflict. Jesus exemplified non-violence, even when he was attacked, spat upon, mocked, and scourged. He met violence by turning the other cheek. And he asks us to do the same. Your challenge this week is to examine your conscience for any signs of violence in your life—in your actions, but also in your words. Make a commitment to responding to violence against your person, be it bullying or being yelled at or being physically attacked, with a strong but peaceful response.

Taize Prayer Service

On Good Friday, April 7th, 7:00PM at St. James Church, Johnson City, there will be a Taize Prayers Service. Taize (tay-zay) is a form of a Christian prayer originating from the ecumenical Christian community of Taize, France. One is invited to rest in God through the singing of psalm verses and other simple chants, alternating with periods of silent reflection. One song of Taize you may be familiar with is the chant, "Jesus, remember me, when you come into your kingdom", which is sun repetitively.
