

Easter: Living in Hope

Easter is the promise of hope, and for us to bring this message into our lives and world. Still living in a COVID time can be despairing, but with the celebration of Easter we can live in hope. Yes, we can wish and dream and imagine—and remain stuck in our Good Friday crypts. So this Easter let us begin to dare to live in hope—hope that frees us from our graves of fear and anxiety, that pulls us out of our graves of denial and cynicism. Let us live our lives in the hope and grace: that, in the Christ who “goes before” us, we can transform our Galilees into the Kingdom of God’s justice and mercy.

Easter Sunday: Justice Challenge

Justice Challenge: The Good News of the resurrection is proclaimed this week in our Scripture reading. This good news is meant for everyone. Jesus was and is a universal savior. One of the insights we receive on Easter Sunday comes from Acts 10. Peter, struggling to be faithful to the teachings of Jesus, announces that he has learned that “God shows no partiality.” This helped to shape many decisions made by the early Church leaders—and it should form our decisions as well. Your challenge this week is to examine how well you live by God’s example. Do you personally and/or as a household how partiality to particular groups of people based on their race, religion, economic level, or occupation? Do you exclude any groups on the same basis? If your reflection reveals partiality to some and exclusion of others, make a commitment to change. Identify three steps you can take so that in the future you can say that you, like God, show no partiality.

Vatican Statement on Same Sex Unions

A few weeks ago on March 16, the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith issued a statement regarding the blessing of same-sex unions, while the basic statement was a reiteration of the church’s stance, the tone was quite strong, harsh, outright hurtful as well as confusing, particularly to sisters and brothers of the LGBTQ+ community. Members of this community have been made to feel unwelcome in the church by such statements, and also by the actions of some clergy. It was like a whiplash moment when the communication from Pope Francis seemed more pastoral, and then this quick, harsh statement made it a gut blow to so many people. Four years ago Fr. James Martin S.J. wrote a book entitled, Building a Bridge. In this book Fr. Martin writes an effort by all parties to find a way to bridge the gap between the institutional church and the gay community. “The essay urges the church to treat the LGBT community with respect, compassion, and sensitivity” (a phrase from the Catechism of the Catholic Church) and the LGBT community to reciprocate reflecting those virtues in its own relationship with the institutional church. The statement of March 16th sounds more like a wall than an effort to build a bridge of respect, compassion, and sensitivity. I particularly liked Fr. Martin’s statement on Twitter “Jesus blessed Zacchaeus by visiting his house (Lk 19), a Roman centurion by healing his servant (Mt 8) and the woman with a hemorrhage by healing her (Mk 5). Thus Jesus blesses a public sinner, a non-Jew and an “unclean” woman. He doesn’t say, “God does not and cannot bless sin.” The whole ministry of Jesus was building bridges, and not creating walls or fences to keep people out. In the Gospels we find Jesus with the marginalized, the victimized, and those who had no voice in his day, and for us as a church we are called to be with them in our world today. We can be bridge builders today by listening with sensitivity to the pain of those who are gay, show respect to their God-given dignity, and be a compassionate family member or friend to those in the LGBTQ community. Here at St. Francis of Assisi know you are ALWAYS welcome, cared for, and loved as sisters and brothers in Christ! May all of us as the faith community of St. Francis of Assisi be bridge-builders through respect, compassion, and sensitivity.

A Prayer for When I Feel Rejected

Loving God, you made me who I am. I praise you and I love you, for I am wonderfully made, in your own image. But when people make fun of me, I feel hurt and embarrassed and even ashamed. So please, God, help me remember my own goodness, which lies in you. Help me remember my dignity, which you gave me when I was conceived. Help me remember that I can live a life of love, because you created my heart. Be with me when people make me feel “less than,” and help me to respond the way you would want me to, with a love that respects the other, but also respects me. Help me find friends who love me for who I am. Help me, most of all, to be a loving person. And, God, help me remember that Jesus loves me. For he too was seen as an outcast. He too was misunderstood. He too was beaten and spat upon. Jesus understands me and loves me with a special love, because of the way you made me. And when I am feeling lonely, help me remember that Jesus welcomed everyone as a friend. Jesus reminded everyone that God loved them. Jesus encouraged everyone to embrace their dignity, even when others were blind to that dignity. Jesus loved everyone with the love that you gave him. And he loves me too. One more thing, God: Help me remember that nothing is impossible with you, that you have a way of making things better, that you can find a way of love for me, even if I can’t see it right now. Help me remember all these things in the heart you created, loving God. Amen.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT on June 19, 2020, The Roman Catholic Diocese of Syracuse, New York (“Diocese”) filed for protection under chapter 11 of title 11 of the United States Code (the “Bankruptcy Code”).

The Bankruptcy Court has established April 15, 2021 at 11:59 p.m. (prevailing Eastern time) as the deadline to file proofs of claim against the Diocese (the “Bar Date”).

If you have a claim against the Diocese including, without limitation, a claim related to sexual abuse committed by any person connected with the Diocese, you must file a claim on or before the Bar Date with Stretto, the appointed Claims Agent.

IF YOU DO NOT TIMELY FILE A PROOF OF CLAIM, YOU MAY FORFEIT YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE ON ANY PLAN OF REORGANIZATION AND TO SHARE IN ANY FUTURE DISTRIBUTIONS TO CREDITORS IN CONNECTION WITH THE DIOCESE’S CHAPTER 11 CASE.
