Reflection: 3rd Sunday of Easter

All three scriptures today speak about "repentance and the forgiveness of sins." The risen Jesus proclaims forgiveness, renewal, and new life. The attitude of Christians is not to be one of revenge and violence, but of reconciliation and forgiveness. The early church community could have reacted to the killing of Jesus, their leader, by trying to get revenge or by trying to destroy those who killed Jesus or throwing out those who denied or betrayed Jesus. They were initially afraid of the authorities; however, Jesus came saying "Peace be with you." Jesus came giving the power to forgive. Instead of fear, revenge and violence, the early community seems to have adopted an attitude of forgiveness and reconciliation, even toward those who had been so hostile to Jesus and his teaching and even toward those who persecuted the early Christian community. In the gospel, Jesus says that this repentance and forgiveness are to be proclaimed to the whole world. Christians are called to believe that sins can be forgiven and are called to forgive other people. In what way are we also called to apply this attitude of mercy and forgiveness to social sin? To groups of people, nations, and institutions? To national leaders and various political groups? To our racial divisions? To situations of economic inequality? To situations of violence and war? To those who have gotten our nation and our world into war? To our use and abuse of our planet and its creatures? We are not called to be passive and do nothing in the face of injustice. We are called to speak up and act boldly. We are called to nonviolence. How does this spirit of forgiveness influence our action for justice? Desmond Tutu, in his book on the truth and reconciliation process in South Africa, No Future Without Forgiveness, wrote "to forgive is indeed the best form of self-interest since anger, resentment and revenge are corrosive of that greatest good, communal harmony that enhances the humanity and personhood of all in the community."

3rd Sunday of Easter: Justice Challenge

In the letter you received recently we communicated to April 18 is Vocations Day. In Sons and Daughters of the Light, our U.S. Catholic Bishops encourage young Sunday, April 21st at 12Noon, following our adults to answer the universal call, or vocation, to holiness, community, and service. While each person lives out their vocation through ---marriage, priesthood, religious life, or single life-we are all called to holiness and community and service. This means that service is not just for Confirmation candidates. It is part of lifelong discipleship. Your challenge this week is to focus on the call to service. Is service a regular part of your or your family's life? Is there one particular cause to which you can give more of your time and talent? The JUST do itthey serve others!

3rd Sunday of Easter: Creation Care Tip

This week, learn something new about climate change and our call to action as Catholics. Resources such as Laudato Si' or Catholics Going Green speak to how caring for creation is connected to our spirituality. Documentaries such as David Attenborough: A Life on our Planet can highlight and explain humanity's impact on climate change while also bringing hope for the future.

St. Gemma Galgani

Born in Tuscany to a devout family, St. Gemma was

attracted to prayer early on, mystically conversing with Jesus, Mary, and her Guardian Angel. Although she was hard working, kind, and a good student, her ecstasies earned her ridicule. She received the stigmata (wounds of Christ) in her body. She lost half her family to tuberculosis and struggled with poor health herself. Although this prevented her from entering the Passionist Order, she was posthumously accepted by them. .

We are one Body

On the road to Damascus, Jesus told Saul that when he attacked Christians, he attacked Jesus. "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting" (Acts 26:15). Our Lord cannot be separated from the members of his Body. We stand united with all who suffer for Christ.

"He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day." John 6:84).

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This Easter, meet Christ at the empty tomb

The Resurrection, more than Jesus' other miracles or teachings, shows His divinity and His Lordship over creation, and His victory over death. Every Easter Sunday, we're called to encounter the Risen Christ at the empty tomb before going out to

empty tomb before bring the Good News of the Resurrection to those who haven't yet heard. This Easter: Visit the

empty tomb. Scripture is "living and active" (Hebrews

4:12), so the events of Jesus' life can still impact us today when we pray with them. During the Easter season, read through John 20:1-18, and picture yourself there. Read with an open heart. No one who meets the Risen Christ remains unchanged. Renew your commitment to Him. Can you remember a moment when Christ called your name and invited you to follow Him? Renew your commitment to follow Christ

more faithfully this Easter. Commit to daily prayer. Offer your errands for the souls in Purgatory. Resolve to go to Confession more often. Don't let anything get in the way of weekly Mass.

> "Go to my brothers and tell them" (John 20:17). Our job is to make more disciples for Jesus

(Matthew 28:19). Invite someone to Mass, pass on inspiring spiritual reading, answer questions about our Faith, be ready to talk about your love for God and your hope for eternity (1 Peter 3:15).



"Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). Christians know that Jesus is our Savior and our lives are in his hands. We also know that by virtue of his

suffering, death, and Resurrection, we have hope of sharing in his glory in Heaven. He said so.

It is through faith that all the other virtues flow. Through faith we believe, "For with God, nothing will be impossible" (Luke 1:37).

3 Ways to be a better communicator

When people encountered Jesus, they knew they were heard, seen, known, and loved by the Father. A large part of this was how He conversed with them. As Christ's disciples aiming to convey the same message, we can

become better communicators with these three skills: Know which conversation you're having. There are three types of conversations: social, emotional, and practical. Maybe someone offered a solution in which a listening ear

was needed or made a corny joke at the wrong time. When in doubt, say something like: "Do you

want me to fix this or just listen?"

This Gospel passage takes us back to the Last Supper, when Jesus told His disciples that He is the vine, and they are the branches. "As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me" (John 15:4). This shows the closeness of the friendship and intimacy Christ wants to draw us into.

Yet, this isn't just a luxury for the few, but a vital necessity for all. "For apart from me you can do nothing" (15:5). As Jesus is who He says He is (God), then we can only have a truly fulfilling,



April 2 - St. Francis of Paola (1507). St. Francis founded the Minim Friars who lived an ascetic life. Known as a miracle-worker, he also had the gift of prophecy. He died in Plessis, in a monastery built for him by the king.

April 8 - The Annunciation of the Lord (1st century). The angel Gabriel visited the Blessed Virgin Mary with the extraordinary news of her role as the mother of God. She had confidence in God's grace and trusted His wisdom.

John 15:1-8, Bearing fruit that will last meaningful, fruitful life to the

degree we live in Christ and Christ lives in us. It really is as simple as that. Our connection with Christ is nourished through daily prayer and the Eucharist, and is healed in Confession. We are part of the Vine when we humbly obey Christ's commands, carry out our duties and acts of

kindness with love,

and offer our sufferings to God. Only then will our lives bear lasting fruit.

April 24 - St. Fidelis of Sigmaringen (1622). In his native Prussia, St. Fidelis became a lawyer and championed the poor and oppressed. He joined the Franciscans. During the Protestant Reformation, St. Fidelis worked hard to bring people back to the Catholic faith, until his martyrdom.

April 27 - St. Zita (1271). Born in Monsagrati, Italy, St. Zita became the servant of the wealthy Fatinelli family. Famous for her miracles in

helping the sick, the poor, and the imprisoned, she is the patroness of domestic workers.



Ask good questions. Jesus asked questions about people's values, past experiences, and perceptions.

Ask open-ended questions, find out what interests them, ask their opinion on a given topic. Seek to understand them. You don't have to agree.

Really listen. Recall the rich young man whom Jesus looked at with love before challenging him to follow Him (Mark 10:21). Avoid checking your phone or thinking about your next response. Give the gift of your full attention.

> Q What is a & **Spiritual** Communion?

Pandemic lockdowns that prevented us from attending Mass in person prompted the rediscovery of Spiritual Communion, the "ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Holy Sacrament and a loving embrace as though we had already received Him" (St. Thomas Aquinas). Thankfully, we have returned to in-person Mass

attendance, but we can still benefit from this devotion. Spiritual Communion keeps us connected to Christ and deepens our awareness of His love throughout the day. Best friends

don't only see or speak to each other once a week or when they need something. They stay in contact daily. Certainly, we have no closer friend than God.

The saints encouraged frequent Spiritual Communion because the practice opens us to much-needed graces. St. Alphonsus Liguori encouraged making three Spiritual Communions during Mass - at the beginning, during the consecration, and at the end - even when we receive the Body and Blood.

Spiritual Communion isn't a substitute for Sacramental Communion. Instead, making frequent Spiritual Communion can enrich our experience when we do receive Communion in person.



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
