

Reintroduction of the Distribution of the Precious Blood (Cup)

Given the easing of restrictions associated with COVID -19 public health emergency, the distribution of the Precious Blood is going to be offered **beginning with** the weekend liturgies of May 6th/7th. The option of receiving from the cup gives a fuller expression of Jesus' command to "take and eat... and take and drink." Receiving from the cup is an option if you so wish to do as you come to communion (if you are not feeling well please forgo the cup). The procedure will be the same as before; come to the Eucharistic Minister, respond "Amen" to the words of that Eucharistic Minister, take the cup in your hands, and with devotion sip from the cup. As always the same procedure will be followed after the communicant leaves. The Eucharistic Minister will wipe the lip of the cup with a cloth, and turn it for the next communicant.

NO INTINCTION (dipping of host into the cup)

The current General Instruction of the Roman Missal [GIRM] offers a fine summary of the theology which undergirds this practice: Holy Communion has a fuller form as a sign when it takes place under both kinds. For in this form the sign of the Eucharistic banquet is more clearly evident and clearer expression is given to the Divine Will by which the new and eternal Covenant is ratified in the Blood of the Lord, as also the connection between the Eucharistic banquet and the eschatological banquet in the Kingdom of the Father (no. 281). The reintroduction of this practice in our parish serves as an opportunity to reflect on the great gift of the Eucharist, the Real Presence of Christ Himself, to the people of God. Especially in this time of National Eucharistic Revival, a renewed appreciation of, and devotion to Jesus, who makes Himself available to us in Holy Communion at every Mass, is a reminder to all of the love of Christ and his desire to remain with his people always.

Spring Book Club

Our parish book club will begin on Tuesday, May 9th, at both 2:00PM or 7:00PM in the Parish Hall. The book is, Living with Real Presence: Eucharist as an Approach to Life by James Meyer. As we are in this time of National Eucharistic Revival, this book can be during this Easter Season.

In this transformative new book, best-selling author, S. James Meyer introduces us to a whole-life encounter with the living Christ, awakening a fresh awareness that the Eucharist is about life, love, and relationships. Living with Real Presence reminds us that our lives, Christ's life, and all lives are united in a sacred communion with our Creator and creation. A spiritual journey for personal reflection or small group discussion, Meyer's "Eucharistic living" is a timely call for Catholics to engage in the National Eucharistic Revival.

3rd Sunday of Easter: Creation Care Tip

'Now on that same day, two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened."—Luke 24:13-14

It seems the disciples thought nothing of walking seven miles in a day to get to their destination. This week, make a commitment to walk somewhere you would normally drive to, or if that's not possible, go for a walk in your neighborhood. Besides saving gas, what do you notice around you that you might have missed otherwise because you have to slow down?

3rd Sunday of Easter: Justice Challenge

Today's Gospel recounts the Emmaus journey of the two disciples. They recognized the resurrected Christ only when he broke bread with them. Saint Damien of Molokai, whose feast day is May 10, is well known for breaking bread with lepers. Your challenge this week is to reflect on the people who need you to break bread with them. Is it the people who come to the local Catholic Worker House for lunch or the homeless shelter? Is it a rich source of prayer and reflection on the Eucharist | the young person sitting alone in the cafeteria at school? Spend some time searching your heart and your community to see who needs you to be bread in their lives. Then break bread with someone new this week, and discover the face of Christ when you do so.
