Prayer:**One With The Suffering People Of Syria**

God of Mercy, hear the cries of your people. How long, O God, must our Syrian sisters and brothers suffer injustice? How long must they be casualties of hollow wars?

With heavy hearts, we watch the aftermath of the chemical attack in Khan Sheikhoun in northern Syria.

With numbing grief, we learn of scores of people, including children, who died after plumes of toxic gas fell upon them, like a “winter fog”— many convulsing, choking, gasping for air, and foaming at the mouth.

They are not numbers, but names, members of a family, our human family. They are mothers, fathers, sons, daughters, and grandparents.

They are the face of your Son—crying out, “My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?” (Matthew 27:46)

Give comfort to the father who carried his lifeless little girl, her lips blue, her dark curls brushing closed eyes, wrapped in a blue sheet.

Give comfort to the mothers and fathers as they lay to rest their children in makeshift burial sites.

Give comfort to those who helplessly watched as family members and neighbors fell like leaves to the ground, gasping for air, struggling to breathe, pleading for help.

Give comfort to the doctors, nurses, and rescue workers as they provide care and treatment to those who survived the attack.

Give comfort to those who live in perpetual fear, to those who are internally displaced, and to those who have fled to neighboring countries as war refugees.

Give strength to those who are making a desperate attempt to reach Europe by land or sea, with many dying tragically along the way.

God, as shocking as this unacceptable massacre is, it is but one episode in the long nightmare of Syria’s civil conflict. It is time that the international community stands up and says, “Enough.”

We join with Pope Francis and “appeal to the conscience of those who have political responsibilities, locally, and internationally, to put an end to this tragedy and to bring relief to that dear population which for too long has been overwhelmed by war.” Amen.

Gospel Reflection

The Gospel story is a story of discovery, of finding God in the unexpected. It challenges us to look for God in the unexpected – especially in welcoming the stranger and the needy and even in our own vulnerabilities. Maybe, now is the time for us to learn anew from the wars in which we are involved. Maybe now is a time for us to reflect on the needs of immigrants and people of other ethnic and national backgrounds. Maybe now is the time for us to learn from the religious experience of others and from their struggle for justice.

The social teaching of the church is concerned with the nourishment of all the people of the world – spiritually and also physically. Whenever we share the Eucharist – whenever we break bread together -- we cannot but be aware of all those who are hungry. We cannot but be aware that all human beings share a common story. We cannot but be aware of our need to share what we have. We cannot but be aware of the need for justice in the world.

One of the important issues confronting the people of the world is the challenge of taking care of our planet and its environment. Pope Francis in Laudato Si wrote about this challenge. Maybe today’s Gospel gives us a model for dealing with this critical issue. The two disciples share their questions and stories with each other and then with the stranger on the road. It is in sharing stories and questions and even disappointments that they learn and their eyes are opened. It is when our human community shares our stories and questions and struggles that we can see things in a new way and maybe learn to work together in a new way for the common good.

“Our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us” (Laudato Si, 1). Pope Francis writes so that we might “enter into dialogue with all people about our common home.”
