

30th Sunday in Ordinary Time: Creation Care Tip

Today we celebrate World Mission Sunday, and this week we celebrate the feast of Saint Anthony of Claret, a Spanish missionary and founder of the religious institute of missionaries known as the Claretians. As the head of the Archdiocese of Santiago in Cuba, Anthony advocated for family-owned farms for the poor of Cuba, believing that if they produced a variety of foods they could feed their families and sell the rest on the market to become self-sufficient. Your challenge this week is to visit a farmer's market or make a point to buy something from a small, local, family-owned farm rather than buying the supermarket chain store version produced by farms owned by multi-national corporations. If you want to learn more about this issue, check out Barbara Kingsolver's book Animal, Vegetable, Miracle or Michael Pollan's Omnivore's Dilemma or In Defense of Food.

Mission Sunday

The Lord hears the cry of the poor. (Psalm 34)

Pope John Paul II writes, "A consistent theme of Catholic social teaching is the option or love of preference for the poor. Today, [especially on this World Mission Sunday weekend,] this preference has to be expressed in worldwide dimensions, embracing the immense numbers of the hungry, the needy, the homeless, those without medical care, and those without hope". To choose for the poor is not optional in our Catholic faith. To choose for the poor is to show "a preferential love on the part of the Church" In 1926 Pope Pius XI instituted Mission Sunday for the whole Church with the first worldwide collection in October 1927. This day is celebrated in all the local Churches as the feast of catholicity and universal solidarity so Christians the world over will recognize their common responsibility. In a world where so much divides us, World Mission Sunday rejoices in our unity as missionaries by our Baptism, as it offers each one of us an opportunity to support the lifegiving presence of the Church among the poor and marginalized in more than 1,111 mission dioceses.

Or are we too focused on our own issues and worries that we tune out the cries of those around us? Your challenge this week is to listen. Be open to hearing the cries of those who suffer from injustice, hatred, hunger, poverty, loneliness, or whatever might be keeping them from living in hope and joy. Listen to people's stories; listen to the news; just listen. Then choose one voice you have heard and decide how you can reach out and help the person whose cry spoke to your heart. It might be just listening further, or it might be donating time or money. The important thing is that you respond to the cry you have heard.
