

Christ The King Reflection

The connection between today’s gospel and Catholic Social Teaching seems very obvious and on one level there is nothing to add. The gospel story reminds us that ultimately, we will be judged by how well we live out the social teaching of Jesus Christ. We will be judged by whether we have responded to the call to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, shelter the homeless, welcome the stranger, serve those who are ill, and visit those who are in prison. Social concerns are an essential part of the Christian life. (When we fall in love with Christ, we want to respond to the needs of our brothers and sisters.)

As direct as we might find the story’s message, there is a danger in reading the story in too limited a way. We might be tempted to limit the story to direct service to those in need. We must not forget that we are called to work for social change in the structures of our world and for empowerment of those in need. We are called to ask why people are hungry or thirsty or homeless or refugees or without medical care or in prison. We are called to look at...

- the structures that keep people from earning the food they need
- the policies that keep people in the developing world from a healthy water supply
- the economic forces that have some people living in substandard homes
- the government rules that make life hard for refugees and immigrants
- the failure of some to see basic medical care as a human right for all
- the challenge of helping those who are unemployed or underemployed
- the injustices in our criminal justice system.

Action is needed now in regards to the present tax reform legislation in Congress. Republican proposals will almost certainly include vast tax cuts for the wealthiest in our nation that lead to cuts to anti-poverty programs like Medicare and Medicaid. At the same time, vital tax credits that exist for low-income and moderate-income individuals and families, like the Earned Income Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit, are on the chopping block. Be a voice for the voiceless!!

Giving Tuesday is a global day of generosity and charity celebrated the Tuesday after Thanksgiving each year. Instead of focusing on buying more things on days like Black Friday and Cyber Monday, Giving Tuesday is about inspiring a spirit of generosity and passing it on to friends and family.

Santa Brings the Perfect Gift

The Christmas rush is upon us to buy, buy, buy and buy! In the Christmas rush, don’t rush to buy the perfect war toy. In these shopping days before Christmas, take some time to think about the toys you are buying for the young people in your life.

We wish each other a “Merry Christmas”; we talk about peace on earth; we call Jesus the Prince of Peace, and yet we place toys of war under the tree and around the manger. So many of the video games depict violence and war so graphically that it borders on the obscene. As a people of faith, don’t we find this a major disconnect from what the true meaning of Christmas is all about? Take seriously the words of the prophet of Advent, Isaiah, and turn our swords into plowshares, spears into pruning hooks, and train for war no more.

Instead of video games and toys that glamorize violence, give gifts of peace. Toys and games that encourage group play, cooperation and old-fashioned fun will offer hours of quality time. For something different and truly meaningful, take part of your allotment for each child and donate it to a worthy cause such as Pax Christi, or Bread for the World. Tell your child what you did and why. Other possibilities such as Heifer International, will send a card depicting the animal you choose to send to a family in a developing country or give to the Arbor Day Foundation and have a tree planted in someone’s name.

Acting in this way, Christmas Day will become a true celebration of Christ, The Prince of Peace. Remember, don’t buy any war toys. Choose toys of peace and give gifts from your heart. Never forget, the children are watching.
